t first glance, **Stacy Henry** is like many moms in Muirfield, happily raising two children along side her husband Byron, trying to keep the daily activities of family life in order. But a second glance reveals an energetic, caring and compassionate personality of someone who lives her life to the fullest by giving back to those most in need.

Stacy is a Co-Founder and Executive Director of Free to Smile Foundation (FTS), a humanitarian organization that provides free dental care and cleft lip/palate surgeries to poor and underprivileged children in some of the most impoverished nations of the world.



Stacy says, "the work she does on a daily basis with FTS is just a natural part of who she is". Growing up on a farm in southern Ohio, Stacy was taught from an early age the importance of hard work and caring for others. ### Lessons from Muirfield House Fires

In the past 2 years, at least three Muirfield homes have suffered fires, with enough damage that the residents had to move out for several months. Two were caused by lightning strikes, a third by a short in a vent fan. Here is a quick summary of advice these residents have for the rest of us.

### **BEFORE A FIRE:**

- Install "rapid rise heat detectors" in your attic. This would have given one of the home owners awareness of the fire 30 minutes before smoke finally permeated living areas.
- Be certain your homeowner's insurance includes a "code update endorsement," so that you do not have to pay out of pocket for improvements now required by building code.
- Google the name of your insurance company with key words like "fire," "claims," and "lawsuits." Two homeowners found that their insurance carrier had a history of lowballing and wearing down the consumer, while the third resident had no problems. Be a strong advocate for yourself.
- If you remodel or redecorate, keep receipts so you have proof of the costs of your carpet, cabinets, faucets, etc. This will help fight low-balling.

about diversity. Stacy taught for 9 years before having children with her husband, but while at home, she recognized a need to continue giving back. In staying true to her background, it was a natural progression for Stacy to team up with Byron, who was donating his time to humanitarian missions providing free dental care and cleft lip/palate surgeries.

Together, Byron and Stacy used their skills and passion of helping others to start Free to Smile. Their mission - to recruit other cleft surgeons, dentists, anesthesiologists, nurses and administrative volunteers who are willing to donate their time and money, travel with them to third world countries and help raise awareness. Their goal - to find sites, work with in-country non-profits, provide care to children in need, train local surgeons to do the dental work and surgeries and then move onto other sites.

In 2012, FTS was able to support dental and cleft palate missions to seven different regions of the world including Guatemala, Mali, Columbia, Cambodia and in the most recent months - Tibet and Niger. To make each mission successful Stacy spends between 20 to 70 hours a week volunteering her time. She says each mission can take up to a years worth of planning. In addition, Stacy manages the day-to-day operations of the foundation fielding inquiries, ensuring ongoing marketing and communication, managing donations, coordinating volunteers as well as being involved in planning upcoming fundraising initiatives.

Stacy says the most gratifying part of what she does is when she is working in the field fulfilling her team lead role. It's on these missions where she feels she is making a difference not just in the lives of the children who require dental and cleft care but also to FTS volunteers. "It's amazing

to see our volunteers complete a mission with new perspective on what they have done, who they have helped and how their life has been impacted".

When asked how she balances the dedication that is required to make FTS a success along with her home life, she says her partnership with her husband is the key to success both in her personal and professional volunteer life. "Without Byron as my partner, I wouldn't be successful in what I do".

Stacy loves living in Muirfield because she really feels the strong sense of support and common values of her friends and neighbors, schools

and churches, whom have helped raise funds for their foundation and increase awareness within the community. "We want to thank our volunteers from within our community who make a difference to our foundation. There are a million different ways to get involved and make a difference for so many others through-out the world."

As far as the future of FTS, both Byron and Stacy hope to see continued growth and success. They hope to have the continual means to visit their mission sites, treat patients, educate local surgeons as well as recruit volunteers who share their vision. Stacy's work with FTS has become part of her daily life and she has no plans to change that in the near future.

- Forget installing lightening rods as there is no evidence they work. Some studies suggest they attract lightning that is too powerful for the rod to disburse.
- Keep a digital inventory of your home including pictures of each room including drawer contents. Your inventory should be kept on an external drive in a secure place away from your home. Save a list of website user names and passwords. Know where your wallet and purse are, as you will need credit cards in the days following your evacuation. Keep these essentials accessible at all times to "grab & go."

#### AFTER A FIRE:

- When firemen arrive, they will ask if you have any flammables or explosives and where they are located. If you have a safe, tell them the location so that they can direct water at it, as they are not fire proof, just fire resistant.
- Have your insurance company stored in your contact list on your cell phone along with your policy number. Call your insurance company during the fire, so they can get tarpers on the scene if there are holes in your roof.
- Unless there is total destruction, you will be allowed back into your home once hot spots are checked and your home is declared safe. Think about what you wish to take to your temporary lodgings including personal items such as jewelry box, laptop or hard drive, basic clothing, etc.
- Be organized. You will need to record all the contents that are being discarded, even if they were not damaged by fire. You will likely have to get rid of plastics, including items like Corian countertops, kitchen storage containers, children's toys, and more. All mattresses and pillows will be discarded, due to soot damage.

- Start adding to your cell phone contacts, using the letter "F" before each fire-related name. E.g., "F contractor Scott". Interrupt anything you are doing to take calls from these folks. Put your contractor on speed-dial. Get a file box and folders, with labels like "legal," "receipts", "financials", etc.
- Immediately start a log, or diary, noting every in-person or phone contact, and matters discussed.
- Give each tradesperson working on the reconstruction a card with your name and cell phone number, encouraging them to call you with any questions and add them into your contact list. Be at the house daily - perhaps bring pizza or cookies for the workmen occasionally.
- · Increase your minutes with your cell phone provider.
- Develop a good accounting system to track payments and moneys received. Separate the account files for contents and structure.
- Notify the County Auditor as you will get a small tax reduction while your home is uninhabitable.
- Remember to cancel your newspaper and forward your mail. Discuss with your cable company how to end your service but retain your e-mail address if it is linked. The firemen will cut your gas and electric. Formally notify the gas company to stop all billing. The gas company might need a few weeks before they can turn your gas back on. Keep track of those delays to help the builder be efficient and not waste days waiting for a utility turn-on.

Keep telling yourselves you will get through this, and your house will be renewed! It is an opportunity as well as a catastrophe.

# HISTORIC DUBLIN TOUR

After lunching at "Biddie's Coach House," built nearly two centuries ago in 1834, the Muirfield Empty Nesters were led on a walking tour of Historic Dublin by Fred Jones, President of the Dublin Historical Society. Herb, who has lived just south of the bridge on Riverview Street for many decades, entertained and informed the group with tales such as Dublin's early settlers housing escaped slaves using the Underground Railroad, and a tornado that led three early churches to merge into one after two of the churches were destroyed. The nearly three hour tour led past the place where horses and wagons used to ford the Scioto River and the spring, where residents obtained water before putting in a pump that stood right in the middle of the intersection of Bridge and High Streets. Herb knew the history of who built each house, and which homes were used as taverns, a hat shop, the first post office, a milliner, the early doctor's homes and much more.
